

Lesvos Updates

In October, the number of arrivals decreased compared to the month before - 1,031 people arrived on Lesvos seeking safety -, but still grew dramatically compared to the same month in the 2 years before. People did not stop embarking on this journey: they are being forcibly and violently stopped on their way to Europe. Pushbacks* are on the rise. Over the past month, 5,115 people (including children and vulnerable people) were reportedly pushed back in the Aegean sea or upon arrival on one of the Aegean islands and, therefore, denied their right to apply for international protection in Europe. This horrible practice has been recently denounced in a report published by MSF that includes numerous testimonies of border violence experienced by their patients on Samos and Lesvos, with detrimental consequences on their physical and psychological well being, as well as life-threatening risks.

In the meantime, the **living conditions of the CCAC** (Closed and Controlled Access Camp) on Lesvos, which now hosts **4,084 residents** and some **hundreds of unregistered people**, are dramatic. The housing units and tents are overcrowded with **worsening hygiene**, **safety and health conditions** and limited access to healthcare. While the temperatures are dropping, many housing units still have **reduced access to electricity**, not allowing people to use electrical heaters or cookers. While the cases of scabies are spreading quickly, the only medical actor previously treating it stopped.

In such times of crisis, a place like **Paréa** is more needed than ever. In the past month, our average daily number of visitors, especially children, grew drastically and so did their needs. **We are and will be here to fill in a growing gap in basic needs and give some sense of community, dignity and normalcy to people on the move.**

The word 'paréa' in Greek means "company, circle of friends": **everyone is welcome in Paréa!**Located within walking distance from the CCAC (*Closed and Controlled Access Camp*) on Lesvos, our community center **Paréa Lesvos** offers a safe space where people on the move, locals and internationals can meet and spend time in a peaceful and welcoming environment.

Paréa is run by **Europe Cares** responsible for the safety, major facility costs, maintenance and development of the center. It is also a **home** to another **9 civil society organizations**: **Boat Refugee Foundation, Circus Lesvos, Leave No One Behind, Makerspace Lesvos, Refocus Media Labs, Refugee Assistance Doro Blancke, Sporos Regeneration Institute, Terra Psy, Yoga and Sport with Refugees.** In a time of high political uncertainty and constant withdrawal of support and international attention from Lesvos, our network of partner organizations joined forces to offer people on the move a **wide range of services** including food and NFI distributions, legal and psychosocial support, education and social care activities. But first and foremost, we offer **a sense of community and belonging**.

We are one community in solidarity. Will you join us?


